Longtime Alderman Sullivan retires

After 25 years of service to the City of Glendale representing Ward 1, Alderman Kay Sullivan has stepped down from the Board of Alderman. Mary Catherine "Kay" Sullivan was sworn into office on May 4, 1987, and has been a fixture and innovator in city government ever since.

- The construction of large infrastructure projects in cooperation with federal, state, and county governments, including the Sappington Road improvement project, Berry Road sidewalk project, Monaco Park and several storm sewer projects.

- A comprehensive approach to infill development within the City of Glendale, culminating in the creation of the Architectural Review Board.

- Last but not least, Sullivan is one of the longest-serving members of the Board of Aldermen, with the distinction of having been in office during the celebrations of the City's 75th (1987) and 100th (2012) anniversaries.

Sullivan's years of service were celebrated April 26 at a reception in her honor, attended by family, friends and colleagues. While she will be deeply missed at the City, we know she is looking forward to spending more time with her husband, Mike, and her children and grandchildren.

Kirkham Avenue reconstruction update

Glendale resident gives rescued paws a chance to be pets

“Abandoned but not forgotten”—that’s the catch phrase for Abandoned Paws Rescue, an animal rescue organization founded by Glendale resident Mark Curfman. The 19-year-old California native, who moved to Glendale six years ago with his family, noticed a need in the St. Louis County area for an additional pet rescue organization. In November 2011, Curfman founded Abandoned Paws Rescue with the help of a number of volunteers and foster families with a mutual belief.

The mission of Abandoned Paws Rescue is to save the lives of abused and unwanted dogs in the St. Louis area. The organization is made up of a group of dedicated volunteers working together for the benefit of helpless and homeless dogs. The program is funded by donations and adoption fees, and the volunteers spend endless hours of rescue work, which involves transporting, fostering and networking.

Rescued animals often make the best pets, Curfman said. “Pets from Abandoned Paws Rescue seem to understand they have a second lease on life,” he said. “In


return for a little affection and attention, these remarkable animals reward their new owners with a love and loyalty unmatched anywhere.”

Adoption from Abandoned Paws Rescue includes medical attention for each rescue dog, including all vaccinations and spay/neuter. The dogs are then placed in loving foster homes until their forever home is found.

Abandoned Paws Rescue participates in “Puppies for Parole,” a rehabilitation program at the Farmington Correction Center. Volunteer inmates work with 10 to 12 dogs, teaching them obedience skills in preparation for the AKC canine good citizen program test. The dogs are then ready for adoption through APR.

Abandoned Paws Rescue also is involved with the Healing Species Midwest, an 11-week violence intervention/character and compassion education outreach. Through the assistance of rescued dogs, the organization helps children to understand and overcome abuse, neglect and grief.

ALDERMEN'S CORNER

Did you know that Glendale is not a Tree City USA? I didn't either until recently. Many of our neighboring municipalities such as Kirkwood, Des Peres and Rock Hill have invested the time and energy into having an organized approach to city tree management and are part of more than 3,400 other communities who've sought out this important designation. There are many benefits and drivers beyond the obvious community pride and positive publicity. It dovetails well with Glendale's recent Coldwell Banker Most Livable City designation (#1 in Missouri.)

The board recently took a critical first step toward achieving this status by seeking out and receiving a Tree Resource Improvement and Maintenance (TRIM) grant. The TRIM program is a competitive cost-share

grant provided and administered by the Missouri Department of Conservation in cooperation with the Missouri Community Forestry Council and the U.S. Forest Service. The grant reimburses the city up to 60 percent of the cost of conducting a citywide street tree inventory.

The inventory will provide spreadsheet data, risk assessments and maps to assist the city in budgeting for and scheduling tree maintenance in the future. The tree inventory will also increase the city's eligibility for additional grant funds to offset tree maintenance program expenditures. These grants could provide up to 75 percent matching funds. As an extension of the inventory, the survey additionally provides GPS locations, species, size, conditions and primary maintenance needs for every tree in the right of way throughout the city and estimates could be as high as 2,300 trees.

The inventory is just one piece to establish a more comprehensive approach to tree

care. First, we must have a Tree Board or Forestry Department. We're fortunate to have so many volunteers in Glendale who already sit on various boards and committees and I have no doubt the same level of interest would be here as well. Our Public Works department (lead by Terry Jones, Foreman) has been helping to organize the steps toward designation, and it's good to see their interest early in the process.

Second, a local tree ordinance is required to support and define an action plan for the board or department to follow. The plan dictates planting, maintaining and removing trees.

Third, we must spend \$2 per capita. On the surface that might sound like an ominous figure. The city's public works budget already includes the cost of tree maintenance so in most cases this amount, if not more, is budgeted currently. Lastly,

Glendale must promote Arbor Day. On April 1 the board passed resolution R9-13 proclaiming Friday, April 5, 2013 as Arbor Day in the city of Glendale. As you can see, we're making incremental progress!

with contractors and property owners to ensure that grass and vegetation on any private property are restored once construction is complete. Construction is scheduled to begin in spring 2014.

The project includes resurfacing the street, reconstructing curbs, eliminating sight distance problems, and improving drainage. Reconstruction of sidewalks and handicapped accessible curb ramps at all intersections will improve pedestrian mobility along the corridor. Relocation of utility poles and installation of decorative lighting will improve safety and make the street more attractive.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$2,447,907 with 80 percent or \$1,958,326 funded by a federal grant.

City to participate in RainScape Rebates

The Glendale Board of Aldermen in January passed a resolution in support of the RainScape Rebates program, a voluntary program that makes \$200,000 in funds available to give financial assistance to landowners wishing to RainScape their yards to improve stormwater management.

The Deer Creek Watershed Alliance is a project of the Missouri Botanical Garden.

RainScaping consists of a wide scope of sustainable landscaping choices that a landowner may employ voluntarily to improve storm water management.

Seventy-five percent of the funds will be reserved for residential landowners; the remaining 25 percent will be available for schools, churches, businesses and parks. The maximum rebate is \$2,000 per site.

The Deer Creek Watershed Management Plan is a voluntary, educational guidance document designed to encourage better stormwater management practices in the Deer Creek Watershed.

All cities that have passed a supporting resolution by April 15 are eligible to participate in a second round of funding.

Mosquito control tips

With spring and summer come the buzzing of mosquitoes. The City of Glendale has one of the most comprehensive mosquito control programs in all of St. Louis County. It is designed to target mosquitoes in all stages of their lifecycle from egg to adult by means of briquettes, trapping and fogging.

Briquettes are applied to all creeks and stormwater inlets throughout the community once a month to prevent mosquito eggs from developing into adults. This is the most effective means to prevent mosquitoes.

Fogging, which targets adult mosquitoes, follows. To be most effective, fogging is conducted during the night hours

when mosquitoes are most active. Fogging begins at dusk every Thursday night from May through late September.

The Public Works Department is asking for citizens' help, in continuing the reduction of egg development. By clearing rainwater from common water-collection sites, such as empty pots, wheelbarrows or children's toys, the life of the mosquito can be greatly reduced. Official No Solicitors stickers available

Visits from door-to-door salespeople, peddlers and other solicitors increase when the spring weather rolls around. Residents who don't wish to be disturbed by these visitors may obtain official "No Solicitors" stickers from City Hall.

Glendale City Code requires that solicitors, canvassers and peddlers have a permit from City Hall before knocking on doors in Glendale. When a prospective solicitor applies for permits, every person connected with that organization who would be visiting homes in Glendale undergoes a background check and is photographed by City staff. Each solicitor must wear a City-issued identification badge and abide by all applicable rules and regulations.

One of the most notable restrictions is that solicitations are strictly limited to
