City begins feasibility study for fire station, police station and City Hall improvements

The City has retained St. Louis architectural firm JEMA to perform a feasibility study to examine alternative designs and cost estimates for making needed improvements to the aging City Hall, which houses Glendale's fire station, police station and administrative offices. The City's fire station was built in 1926 and was expanded in later years to include the current police station and city administration office. A 2009 evaluation of the City Hall complex identified several issues with the building, including structural and functional problems, space needs, accessibility and building code compliance issues, and electrical and mechanical problems.

The City reviewed responses from five St. Louis-based architectural firms earlier this summer and selected JEMA to perform the feasibility study and preliminary design based on JEMA's experience and local connections. Jonathan Emert, a JEMA partner and project architect, is a Glendale resident and will bring a home-team effort to the project. JEMA's team has completed several other successful fire station, police station and city hall design projects in the St. Louis area.

The City asked JEMA to first conduct a feasibility study to consider alternatives for the



needed building improvements. Alternatives under consideration include renovating and expanding the existing complex or demolishing the existing complex and building a new facility. JEMA is expected to present pros and cons, floor plans and cost projections for each alternative in August. This will guide city officials in selecting the most cost-effective and best investment for ensuring that the City is able to continue to provide a high level of services to its residents.

Once an alternative is selected, JEMA will immediately begin the preliminary design process to provide the City and its residents with more detailed building plans and elevations and a more precise cost projection to determine financing needs.

Regardless of the alternative selected, the improvements will require financing from additional revenues, and it is anticipated that the City will include measures on the April

## Glendale has a long scouting tradition

Many Glendale families are part of a longstanding tradition of participating in Boy Scouts. Troop 360 has been chartered out of North Glendale Elementary since 1942, and Troop 335 has operated out of Mary Queen of Peace since 1952.

The City of Glendale has benefited from several Eagle Scout projects over the years.

Recently, Owen Wilhelms of North Glendale Troop 360 built and erected bat houses near the wooded area of the Glendale Public Works property and at the house of Alderman Aaron Nauman, an assistant scoutmaster. Owen presented a report to the Mayor and Board explaining how bats control insects and how bat boxes provide an alternative shelter for bats instead of on residents' homes. Owen became the 229th Troop 360 Scout to earn the rank of Eagle.

## Vitale's Deli to take over salon space

Vitale's "Off-the-Hill" Deli plans to open at 425 N. Sappington Road on Aug. 15, when the aroma of fresh bread, rolls and coffee will begin wafting throughout the City.

A recent transplant to Glendale from the City of St. Louis, Mike Vitale had always been interested in opening a restaurant in Glendale. When he noticed earlier this year that the space across from the fire station was available for rent, he knew he would be able to realize his dream.

Vitale had been eyeing the 600-square-foot former beauty salon space for a long time, thinking that it would be ideal for an old-fashioned deli. He plans to offer custom-made sandwiches that customers can pre-order and pick up on the way to

work. The deli also will offer coffee, muffins, breakfast pastries, bagels, side dishes, cookies and biscotti.

Vitale, of the famed Vitale's Bakery family from The Hill, understands both The Hill, where he grew up, and Glendale, his home for the past seven years. And he knows a thing or two about biscotti and bread, which he has baked for years at the bakery. Vitale's Bakery is a supplier of Anthonio's Taverna, Blues City Deli, three Saracino restaurants and eight Gianino family restaurants. The bakery also supplies pizza shells and doughballs to Dog Town Pizza and other restaurants and hot dog buns to Steve's Hot Dogs.

The deli will open at 7 a.m. and close at 4 p.m. six days a week.

2016 ballot. Financing alternatives under consideration include a property tax and a ¼-cent fire sales tax. Glendale is currently the only municipal fire department in St. Louis County without a ¼-cent fire sales tax. This sales tax would generate approximately \$60,000 in annual revenue; however, it is not believed to be enough by itself to finance anticipated building improvement needs.

Please stay tuned to the City's website, future newsletters and other media this fall and winter as cost projections, financing recommendations and proposed building plans become available.

### City participates in ongoing Prescription Pill and Drug Disposal program

The City of Glendale and Glendale Police Department are participating in the Missouri Prescription Pill and Drug Disposal (P2D2) program, which is sponsored by the St. Louis Metropolitan Sewer District, Missouri American Water and the St. Louis College of Pharmacy. The program also is funded in part by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources.

The Missouri P2D2 program is designed to help protect the environment and citizens' health by properly disposing of unused drugs and medication. The program is a nonprofit organization.

How the Missouri P2D2 Program works: Bring unused prescription drugs and/or over-the-counter medicines to the collection box located in the lobby of the Glendale Police Department. The program is free and anonymous.

## Chief Zeitzmann retires after 27 years with Glendale Fire Department

Fire Chief Larry Zeitzmann retired May 8 after nearly 27 years with the Glendale Fire Department. At a send-off party at City Hall, Mayor Richard Magee announced the naming of the Chief Larry Zeitzmann Community Service Award in the chief's honor. The name of each year's recipient of the award will be added to the plaque, which will hang in City Hall.

Zeitzmann was hired as a Glendale firefighter Aug. 14, 1988, after serving as a lieutenant and captain with the Washington Volunteer Fire Department in Washington, Missouri. With Glendale, he was promoted to engineer in April 1989 and elevated to chief Oct. 1, 1998. He served as acting city administrator from March through September 2010.

Over his career, Zeitzmann played a significant role in developing standard operating guidelines for the Central Core fire departments and was instrumental in providing firefighter safety and rapid intervention training for thousands of firefighters throughout St. Louis County, the State of Missouri and neighboring states. He has been an adjunct instructor with the University of Missouri Fire and Rescue Training Institute and co-developed the Institute's Rapid Intervention Team Tactics program.

As a certified National Incident Support Team member and trainer, he has been deployed to numerous disaster areas in the state. He served as Fire Planning Section Chief for the 2004 presidential debate at Washington University.

Zeitzmann is a past president of the Greater St. Louis Area Fire Chiefs Association, past chairman of the Central Core Fire Chiefs Operations Committee, past coordinator of Missouri Region C Mutual-Aid Area 4 and past St. Louis County Liaison Officer to the City of St. Louis Fire Department. He holds numerous professional certificates.

Zeitzmann put his personal carpentry skills to work by making several improvements to the fire station and City Hall, including remodeling the city administrator's office and building the dais in the aldermanic chambers. In his spare time, he coaches soccer and baseball for the Crosspoint Christian School in Villa Ridge.

Containers were purchased, planted and placed in front of downtown businesses and at all the entrance signs to Glendale. Volunteers added flowers to two St. Louis Stone planters at City Hall that were donated by Gateway Greening and Bill Ruppert, in honor of his parents, who were longtime Glendale residents. The students at North Glendale Elementary, along with GGG, planted native plants in the parking lot islands and native wildflower seeds along the parking lot fence and built and planted two living walls for the students to enjoy.

Even as GGG takes the time to enjoy

the summer and the beautiful city, it's time to start planning for what's next. Grow Glendale Gorgeous will kick off its annual fundraising campaign in August. Each year, GGG will have to raise funds to continue to provide spring plantings and materials needed to continue the environmental education programs at North Glendale. ## Work progresses on Kirkham, Lockwood, Berry, other city streets

Despite the rain this year, we've seen the completion of some long-awaited street improvements.

The city completed the \$1.69 million Kirkham Avenue reconstruction project. Included in this project was the replacement or installation of ADA-accessible sidewalks and crosswalks as well as retaining walls, concrete curbing, a smooth asphalt driving surface and decorative lighting matching that along N. Sappington Road. This fall, plans call for the removal of the honeysuckle along the north side of Kirkham Avenue just west of N. Berry Road and replacement with a decorative vegetative screening.

While Kirkham Avenue was wrapping up, St. Louis County began the \$1.5 million improvement project along Lockwood

Boulevard/Adams Avenue from N. Berry Road to Kirkwood Road. Kicking off the project was the installation of ADA-accessible sidewalk ramps, sidewalk and curbing repairs, and a new asphalt driving surface. Dedicated left-hand turn lanes were added at the intersection with N. Sappington Road to improve efficiency within the intersection, and the outermost driving lanes along Lockwood in Glendale were deleted, reducing the number of lanes from four to two. The deleted driving lanes were repainted and stenciled for parking and bicycle traffic.


Shortly after finishing work along Lockwood Boulevard, St. Louis County then turned its attention to the \$934,000 N. Berry Road improvement project. Again, ADA-accessible sidewalk ramps were in-

stalled and repairs were made to existing sidewalk and curbing sections, all topped off with a new asphalt driving surface.


Finally, the city completed this year's \$150,000 resurfacing schedule with the installation of Nova Chip along Glen Elm Drive, Kenmore and Glenmoor lanes, Victoria and Glenbrook avenues and Queen Anne Place. Each of these projects began two years ago with the replacement of the water main and refurbishing of the sewer mains, followed last year with the installation of new asphalt curbing, as needed.

The city plans to continue allowing utility companies to replace or repair aged underground systems one to two years ahead of the resurfacing schedule.


### SOURCES OF REVENUE FOR THE GENERAL FUND BUDGET 2015-16
